BERGEN DOMKIRKE BERGEN CATHEDRAL

Bergen domkirkes Riegerorgel stod ferdig i 1997, og Bergen fikk da sitt første orgel med over 60 stemmer noensinne. På slutten av 1890-tallet ble det installert orgler med tre manualer i tre av byens kirker, også i domkirken, der Albert Hollenbach bygget orgel i 1891. Det er Hollenbachorgelets fasade som også gir ansikt til Riegerorgelet. Med Riegerorgelet fikk Domkirken og Bergen sitt hittil største orgel, og dette instrumentet har gitt orgelkulturen i Bergen et betydelig oppsving.

The Rieger organ at Bergen Cathedral, completed in 1997, was the first organ with over 60 stops ever to be built in the city. In the late 1890s, three city churches had three-manual organs installed. These included an organ for the cathedral, built by Albert Hollenbach in 1891. The façade of this organ was kept for the Rieger organ. The Rieger organ, the largest organ in the history of Bergen and the cathedral, has given the organ culture of Bergen a considerable boost.

MARIAKIRKEN ST MARY'S CHURCH

Mariakirkens nye orgel er bygget av det tyske orgelbyggeriet Josef Weimbs Orgelbau og har 31 stemmer fordelt på to manualer og pedal. Instrumentet ble innviet den 21. juni 2015. Klanglig er orgelet forankret i tysk-barokke forbilder. Med dette som utgangspunkt har Weimbs Orgelbau bygget et teknisk moderne instrument som klanglig har en sterk historisk forankring. Orgelets fasade er tegnet av arkitekt Ulf Oldæus (Stockholm).

The new organ at St. Mary's Church is built by the German organ builder Josef Weimbs Orgelbau, and has 31 stops spread over two manuals and pedals. The instrument was inaugurated 21st of June 2015. It is inspired by the German Baroque organ building tradition. In view of this, the instrument is, in terms of technology, a modern instrument, but with a sound which gives the listener a sense of history. The facade is created by the architect Ulf Oldæus from Stockholm.

JOHANNESKIRKEN ST JOHN'S CHURCH

Johanneskirkens orgel ble bygget i 1893 av Schlag & Söhne – et av datidens ledende orgelfirma – og sto ferdig ved kirkens innvielse i mars 1894. Teknisk sett representerte det noe helt nytt, idet pneumatikken ble tatt i bruk for første gang på våre breddegrader. Orgelet ble ombygget i 1967 fordi nye klangidealer gjorde seg gjeldende. I 1999 ble orgelet restaurert av Orgelwerkstatt Chr. Scheffler (Frankfurt an der Oder) og tilbakeført til tilnærmet original stand. Av de mer enn 1000 opus som Schlag & Söhne bygget, er dette sannsynligvis det eneste som er bevart med originale fasadepiper.

The organ of St. John's Church, built in 1893 by the German organ builder Schlag und Söhne, was completed at the churchs inauguration in March 1894. Technically the organ presented something completely new, as pneumatic action was used for the first time here at our latitudes. The organ was rebuilt in 1967 due to new ideals. In 1999 the organ was restored nearly back to its original shape by Christian Scheffler (Frankfurt an der Oder, Germany). Of all the numerous organs built by Schlag & Söhne, this is probably the only preserved one with original facade pipes.

ST. PAUL KIRKE ST PAUL'S CHURCH

Orgelet i St. Paul kirke er bygget av det canadiske firma Casavant i 1919. Instrumentet kom til St. Paul kirke høsten 2015 og ble restaurert og oppjustert . Åkerman & Lund (Knivsta/ Sverige) har stått for arbeidet her i Bergen. Kirken fikk ved samme anledning oppjustert inngangsparti, gallerier, nytt klimaanlegg m.m. Orgelet er det ene av to som orgelbyggeriet fra Canada har levert til Europa. Instrumentet er symfonisk og klangestetikken bærer preg av både franske og angloamerikanske idealer. Ifølge den franske komponisten Vierne var Casavant «verdens beste orgelbygger» for sin tid. Orgelet er utstyrt med justerbart pedalklaviatur m.m.

The organ at St Paul's Church was built in 1919 by the Canadian firm Casavant Frères for Saint Charles' Church in Quebec. In 2015, it was restored by its original builder, then re-installed here at St Paul's Church in 2015 by the Swedish organ firm Åkerman & Lund. For this purpose, a new organ loft was built, as well as a new climate control system. The organ – one of only 2 Casavant organs in Europe – has 40 stops, 3 manuals, and an adjustable pedal board. It is symphonic in character and its voicing combines French and Anglo-American traditions.

NYKIRKEN NEW CHURCH

Kirkens nåværende orgel er bygd av J. H.Jørgensen i 1957. Det har mekanisk ryggpositiv og forøvrig elektrisk overføring. I pedalen er der flere såkalt unit-stemmer, dvs. at flere registre i ulik tonehøyde stammer fra samme piperekke, som er utvidet oppover så langt det er behov for det.

New Church's current organ was built by J. H. Jørgensen in 1957. It has a positive division (Rückpositiv) with mechanical action, while the remaining divisions of the organ have electric action. The pedal includes several so-called unit stops, i.e. a system where several registers/ stops come from the same row of pipes, extended upwards as far as deemed desirable.

B I O G R A F I E R BIOGRAPHIES

KARSTEIN ASKELAND studied church music at the Bergen Music Conservatory. He then studied organ performance with Prof. Edgar Krapp at the Academy of Music in Frankfurt am Main, where he played his diploma examination in 1985, and his concert examination two years later. Askeland played his debut concert at Oslo Concert Hall in 1986. Since then he has performed throughout Europe, and in Russia, the USA, and South America.



His concerts have been presented by the Norwegian National Broadcasting Company (NRK) and by several radio channels abroad. He has done significant work for new music through his close co-operation with several important Norwegian composers, premiering a number of new works. His interaction with Ketil Hvoslef has resulted in several commissions and a CD production with Hvoslef's organ works. Askeland was employed as organist in Bergen in 1987, and became Music Director at St. Mary's Church in 2001. From 2010 until 2015 he was organist at Bergen Cathedral. He is Adjunct Professor of organ at the Grieg Academy of Music, University of Bergen. His work as an organ consultant has resulted in several instruments that have been the subject of much professional interest.

0TTO CHRISTIAN 0DLAND grew up in Bergen, but is now living in Oslo with his family. He was appointed cathedral organist in the catholic cathedral St. Olav in Oslo in 2014, and is also assistant professor in liturgical organ-playing at the Norwegian Academy of Music. In Bergen, he has previously worked in the St. Mary's church, Sælen church and the St. Paul's church. He is educated at the Grieg academy of music in Bergen and at the Norwegian academy of music in Oslo. He had his



diploma concert in 2002 after studies with the professors Terje Winge and Kåre Nordstoga. Later on, he met David Sanger for organ studies in Carlisle (Cumbria), paid for by a stipend from the Norwegian state. He regularly plays concerts in Norway. Before Corona he played solo concerts in organ festivals in Czech Republic and in Polen. He is also accompanying choirs and soloists. The last eighteen years he has been organist for "Sølvguttene", Norwegian Broadcasting Boys' Choir. With them, he has played concerts all over Norway and in several European countries and cities (Berliner Dom, Thomaskirche - Leipzig, St. Michaelis - Hamburg, St. Martin in the Fields - London, Rome, Rhodos, Poland) He has also participated in several radio- and TV-productions with them. Autumn 2016, he followed the choir to USA and recorded a CD with them. Next autumn he will play concerts with them in Denmark. For four short periods between 2010-1016, he took the role as cathedral organist in Gloucester Cathedral, England, and for six years he was the main organist for the trumpet player Ole Edvard Antonsen, going on Christmas tour.

LARS INGE TJØSTHEIM (b. 1971) studied organ and piano in Stavanger, Norway. His organ teachers were Kolbein Haga and Per Fritjof Bonsaksen. He has since then been an active soloist an accompanist on both instruments. Since 2014 he has been exploring the world of the pressure wind harmonium, an instrument quite common from 1840 until about 1930, with a good deal of serious music written for it (mostly french, but also some german (Karg-Elert)).



EIVIND BERG is organist at St. John's Church in Bergen. He did his Bachelor studies in church music at the Norwegian Academy of Music in Oslo, studying organ with Bjørn Boysen and choral conducting with VIvianne Sydnes. From 2015 until 2018, Berg studied a the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna with Martin Haselböck (organ) and Thomas Kiefer (choral conducting), where he completed a Master's Degree in both



church music and organ performance. He received top grades in both disciplines. The main focus of the church music studies in Vienna was on organ playing and leading early music. While there, he worked with various ensembles, and during his final exam concert Berg performed a mass by the Austrian composer Johann Joseph Fux, directing the choir and ensebmle from the organ. In the last few years, he has performed as organist in several TV and Radio productions in Austria and Germany. Among other things, he played an organ recital together with the cellist Julia Hagen which was broadcast live on Austria's main TV channel in September of 2018.

SIGURD MELVÆR ØGAARD was born in Bergen in 1978 and began studying the organ at age ten. In 1996, he attended the International Summer Academy for Organists in Haarlem, The Netherlands, where he studied with Piet Kee. From 1997-2002, Øgaard was an organ performance major at the Grieg Academy in Bergen. As part of his undergraduate work, he spent a semester at the Birmingham Conservatoire in England, while also working



as organ scholar at St. Mary's Collegiate Church in Warwick. In 2002, Øgaard moved to the USA to work as Organist and Assistant Director of Music at First United Methodist Church, Lubbock, Texas. During his time there, he completed a Master's Degree and a

DMA in choral conducting at Texas Tech University. After relocating to Houston in 2011, he worked first as organist at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church until 2014, then as Cathedral Organist at Christ Church Cathedral. From 2012 until 2015, he was Organist and Accompanist for Bach Society Houston, as well as instructor of improvisation at the University of Houston. Since September 2015, Øgaard has been Cathedral Organist at Bergen Cathedral in Norway. He has performed extensively in Europe and the USA. Performance venues have included St. Bavo Church, Haarlem (the Netherlands); St. Paul's, Westminster, and Coventry Cathedrals (England); and Washington National Cathedral (USA).

MARI FUKUMOTO (b. 1987) is one of the leading and successful international concert organists of her generation. Since she won the 1st prize at prestigious international organ competitions, International Organ Competition Musashino-Tokyo in Japan, International Organ Week Nurnberg in Germany, inter alia, she is beloved guest performer at worldwide famous festivals, cathedrals and concert halls such as the Suntory Hall in Japan, Cairo Opera



House in Egypt or Philharmonie Essen in Germany. As Soloist, she has performed with numerous outstanding orchestras including the Kyoto Symphony Orchestra, the Tokyo City Philharmonic Orchestra, the Slovak Radio Symphony Orchestra and the Łódź Philharmonic Orchestra. Furthermore, Mari Fukumoto took over a position as artist in residence at the concert hall "National Forum of Music" in Wrocław, Poland in the last season. Her energetic performance with virtuosity and sensitivity fascinate the audiences in live as well as with broadcasting; the latest recording which she played with the NFM Wrocław Philharmonic Orchestra under the direction of Pascal Roché will be released in this autumn from Anaklasis. Since the summer semester in 2019, she teaches as senior lecturer organ playing, organ improvisation and basso continuo at the University of Music Franz Liszt Weimar in Germany.

KARSTEN GYLDENDORF was born in 1963 in Næstved. He started piano lessons at the age of 7, and already at the age of 15 he got his first permanent position as organist. He graduated from the Royal Danish Academy of Music in Copenhagen as an organist and choir master, and in 1992 he made his debut as an organ soloist after studying under professor Hans Fagius.



Further studies in Paris under Marie-Claire Alain and Daniel Roth led to a first prize in organ interpretation. He was the first to receive the Robert Russell Memorial Scholarship. Karsten Gyldendorf has performed as a soloist at organ recitals in a number of European countries and in radio broadcasts in Denmark, Norway and Latvia. Since 1995 he has held the position as organist at Herlufsholm Church, Næstved. In 2020 he celebrated 25 years as organist in Herlufsholm and 40 years in "Folkekirken" as well.

AKIKO WATANABE was born in Japan, and today she is a church organist in Sweden. In Japan she enjoyed to play jazz standards and pop music on the Hammond organ for many years. She has a master's degree from the Royal Academy of Music in Stockholm. She works as organist at Allerum's parish and also is a freelance organist, and gives programs with only classical organ music, with only jazz standards, or with classical organ music and jazz standards combined. She has played at St Jacob church, St



Clara church, Engelbrekt's church in Stockholm, Stora kyrkan and Hornsberg's church in Östersund, Teg's church in Umeå, the Cathedral of Lund, Strängnäs and Uppsala, St Johannes church in Malmö, and other churches. She plays jazz standards with the trio "Strawtowns Finest" with a pianist and a drummer at several churches in southern Sweden. She loves music from late romanticism and modern music for organ, and you can listen to some works from these periods from Japan, Sweden, Finland, Poland, France and the USA.

IVAN SARAJISHVILI, a doctoral candidate at Eastman, was born in Tbilisi, Georgia (August 5, 1972) to a family deeply rooted in Georgian musical tradition. He started playing piano at the age of seven. After acquiring a university degree in International Law in 1994 (State University, Tbilisi), he was admitted to the Sacred Music Department of the State Academy of Music in Oslo, Norway. He also received an EU scholarship for historical performance studies at Hochschule der Künste in Berlin,



graduated with bachelor in Sacred Music in 2000, Master in Sacred Music in 2002 (Oslo) and was awarded Post Master Soloist Diploma in 2004 (Royal Danish Academy of Music, Copenhagen). His interest in early music and historical performance has been permanent. Ivan has been featured as a performer several times on BBC 3. He is currently the Music Director and Cathedral Organist at Stavanger Cathedral, Norway. Having sat on the

program board of Norwegian Organ Festival since 2007, he also acts as Artistic director of the Summer Festival at Stavanger Cathedral.

MELISSA DERMASTIA teaches organ at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, works as a church musician at the Cathedral of Klagenfurt/Austria and is artistic director of the "Kärntner Madrigalchor Klagenfurt". Starting in 2023 she is going to be music director at the Cathedral of Graz/Austria. Melissa was born in Klagenfurt and received her first piano and organ lessons at the local conservatory. At the University of Music and Performing



Arts in Vienna she finished her studies in Church Music (main focus on choral conducting and early music), concert organ, piano pedagogy and organ pedagogy with distinction. She studied with Peter Planyavsky (organ), Michael Lipp (piano), Erwin Ortner (choral conducting), Johannes Ebenbauer (improvisation), Stefan Gottfried (fortepiano) and Birgid Steinberger (voice). Besides taking part in many masterclasses with internationally acclaimed organists and pianists she studied organ in Paris with Olivier Latry and Michel Bouvard at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Paris. She was a finalist at various national and international organ competitions and was awarded the honorary prize at her University in Vienna. As a solo recitalist on the piano and the organ, but also in chamber music formations or with orchestra, she has played in prestigious concert venues (Vienna: Radiokulturhaus (radio broadcast live concert), Jesuitenkirche, Schottenkirche, Franziskanerkirche, Chateau de Versailles/FR, Muri/CH, etc.).

JONAS APELAND, born in Bergen in 1997, started playing the organ at the age of six. After receiving organ lessons in Orgelklubben Ferdinand with Amund Dahlen, Langhaugen high school with Mariko Takei and at the Grieg Academy with Karstein Askeland, Apeland started a bachelor's degree in church music at the Norwegian Academy of Music in Oslo with professor Terje Winge. Apeland finished his bachelor's degree with a year as an



exchange student in Montréal, Canada, at McGill University in the organ class of professor Hans-Ola Ericsson, where he also got extensive training in harpsichord and early music with professor Hank Knox. In the fall of 2020, Apeland started his master's degree in organ performance at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse de Paris with professors Olivier Latry and Michel Bouvard as organ teachers, Thomas Ospital

in counterpoint and with Thomas Lacôte as his supervisor in the master's paper which focused on gregorian chants in Olivier Messiaen's organ music. The master's degree was finished in June 2022 with a concert on the great Cavaillé-Coll organ in Église de la Sainte-Trinité, with works by Messiaen. The exam concert was rewarded with the highest achievable grade from the jury.

KÅRE NORDSTOGA (b. 1954) studied at the Norwegian Academy of Music under Søren Gangfløt, Bjørn Boysen, and Kaare Ørnung, among others. Following his debut concert in 1978, he continued his studies under David Sanger in London, and he was for a time organist at Ullern Church, before coming to Oslo Cathedral in 1984. He has also been associated with the Norwegian Academy of Music, where he was appointed professor



in 1994. As cathedral organist at Oslo Cathedral, Nordstoga frequently performs a large repertoire, which has included two popular concert series with Bach's complete organ works. His recordings include the organ music of Bach, Brahms, Franck, Widor, and Liszt, all of Bach's violin sonatas recorded on the cathedral's chancel organ in collaboration with violinist Geir Inge Lotsberg, as well as several recordings of Norwegian organ music. He has recently recorded the 12 main organ works of Cesar Franck, and next year he will finish a new CD-project consisting the complete organ music of J.S. Bach recorded on historical organs. Nordstoga is an active concert organist. In recent years he has been soloist with the symphony orchestras of Oslo, Bergen, and Trondheim, and he has played at international organ festivals in Aarhus, Paris, and Tokyo, among others. In 2006 he was awarded the Lindeman Prize for his active contribution to musical life.

MARTIN WELZEL maintains a full schedule of concert performances throughout Europe and North America. His performances have included St. Paul's Cathedral in London, Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris, Stellenbosch University (South Africa), and Washington National Cathedral (USA). He has been featured as a solo artist at international music festivals in Finland (Helsinki, Pori, Turku), France, Germany, Italy, and Russia, and was



acting professor of organ at the Musikhochschule in Saarbrücken and lecturer of piano accompaniment at Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität in Munich. Since 2021, he is Associate Organist at Munich Cathedral. Born in 1972 in Vechta (Germany), Martin Welzel received

his first musical training in Bremen. Later, he studied organ with Daniel Roth and Wolfgang Rübsam at the Musikhochschule in Saarbrücken, where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in sacred music and organ performance, as well as an artist diploma in organ performance. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance from the University of Washington in Seattle (USA), where he studied with Carole Terry and wrote a dissertation on Jeanne Demessieux. In addition, he was the recipient of a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship. He has recorded three CDs for Naxos with organ music by Max Reger at Trier Cathedral. (www.martinwelzel.com).

MAGNE H. DRAAGEN was born in 1974. After studying at the Norwegian Academy of Music in Oslo, with Terje Winge and Kåre Nordstoga, he obtained a bachelor's degree in church music and subsequently a soloist diploma as organist. Draagen has held posts at Gamlebyen Church, Gamle Aker Church and Trinity Church in Oslo, as well as the position as organist and choirmaster at Oslo Cathedral, where he was artistic director of Oslo Cathedral



Boys Choir. From 2010-2011 he was Director of Music at Stavanger Cathedral as head of the choir department, and from 2012 till 2021 he held the position as Director of Music at Nidaros Cathedral. He concurrently held teaching posts in various church music disciplines at the Norwegian Academy of Music, the University of Stavanger and at the Norwegian University of Science and Technology in Trondheim. Since 2021 he holds the position as cantor and organist at the Church of St. Michael in Hamburg. As a composer and arranger he has produced a number of church music works for various groups of performers. As an organ recitalist he has an international reputation, and has contributed to numerous recordings both as composer, arranger, conductor, accompanist and soloist.

SINDRE SEIM GULBRANDSEN was born in 1997 and grew up in the city of Halden in the southeast of Norway. At a young age he started playing the piano and took lessons with Elisabet Hellström. From the age of 14 he received organ lessons from Marie Håkensen in the Immanuel church of Halden. In 2016 he started his Bachelor studies of Church music at the Norwegian Academy of Music in Oslo with the professors Karin Nelson, Inger-Lise Ulsrud, Terje



Winge, Tore Erik Mohn and Vivianne Sydnes. Parallel to the studies, he worked as a church musician in Oslo, organising and playing organ concerts as well as accompanying choir

projects and playing services. As a part of the Erasmus+ exchange program Gulbrandsen spent the academic year of 2019–2020 studying at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater "Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy" in Leipzig with professor Dr. Martin Schmeding and Freiberger Domkantor Albrecht Koch. Since 2020 he is studying Master of Church music at the Hochschule für Musik, Theater und Medien Hannover, organ interpretation with professor Emmanuel Le Divellec, organ improvisation with professor Dirk Elsemann and conducting with the professors Andreas Felber, Hildebrand Haake and Frank Löhr. He is working as a choir conductor and organist in the Lutheran Church of Hannover.

EDGAR KRAPP, born in Bamberg, studied with Franz Lehrndorfer at the Munich Musikhochschule and with Marie-Claire Alain in Paris. After winning first prize at ARD international music competition he began his career as concert organist and educationalist. He has performed in many European countries, in America and in Japan. His broad repertoire is documented on many recordings, mostly on historical instruments. Edgar Krapp



has rendered particularly outstanding service to the organ works of Johann Sebastian Bach, which he has previously performed as a cycle in Frankfurt, Nurember and in Munich. The main emphasis of his work lies in concert performances with orchestra conducted by such distinguished musicians as R. Kubelik, C. Davis, L. Maazel, V. Fedoseyev, H. Stein and C. Eschenbach with whom he has performed the organ concertos by Handel, organ concertos and organ symphonies by Saint-Saëns and Guilmant, Poulenc, Hindemith, Genzmer, as well as premières including the works for organ and orchestra by Bialas, von Bose and Kubelik. He has collaborated with famous orchestras like Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra, Bamberg Symphonica, Frankfurt Radio Symphony Orchestra, Vienna Symphonica among others. From 1974 to 1993, Edgar Krapp taught at the Frankfurt Musikhochschule, where he succeeded Helmut Walcha. He was also a guest professor at Salzburg Mozarteum. In 1993 he joined the Munich Musikhochschule. In recognition of his artistic and educational services, he was awarded the Frankfurt Music Prize, the E.T.A. Hoffmann Prize of the town of Bamberg as well as the Friedrich Baur Prize. He is a member of the directorate of the Neue Bachgesellschaft Leipzig and the Bavarian Academy of Fine Arts.

INES MAIDRE, a graduate of the Estonian Academy of Music, Tallinn, holds soloist diplomas of both piano and organ with the highest distinctions. Her postgraduate studies with Daniel Roth in Paris were crowned with a Prix d'excellence avec les félicitations and at the Concours Musicale d'Ile de France in 1991 she also won the First Prize in organ playing. Later she also undertook an extensive course on Baroque interpretation at the Grieg Academy in Bergen and gained a diploma in harpsichord. Since 2014 she is the artistic director of the Pärnu International Organ Festival.



Besides her performing career IM has been teaching the organ at the Estonian Music Academy and is now an associate professor of organ at the Grieg Academy, University of Bergen, Norway. As a part of her scholarly activities she has given master classes and lectures at different music high schools, organist conferences and summer courses in Europe and America. During the last twenty years she has performed on many prestigious international festivals in Europe, North America and South America and has appeared as a soloist in a number of organ concertos by Poulenc, Jongen, Barber, Lepnurm, Rheinberger etc The artist's collaboration with various soloists and ensembles has resulted in many programs combining organ with Gregorian chant, trumpet, saxophones, dance, percussion, violin, synthesizer etc. As a harpsichord/organ player in several early music ensembles IM has played a wide selection of repertoire from early Renaissance to late Baroque. Maidre has released several CDs for Toccata Classics. Grappa, Eres, Antes and Carillon Music.

HANNAH MARIE CARDING is an Oslo-based musician who studied singing at Barratt Due Institute of Music, and organ and church music at the Norwegian Academy of Music. In 2019 she fulfilled her Master's degree in solo organ performance, under the guidance of professor Terje Winge. Since then she has established herself as an accomplished concert organist, and has performed at many of Norway's leading cathedrals and concert halls. Highlights



include solo concerts in Tønsberg Cathedral and Bragernes Church's Vierne jubilee in 2020, "International Organ Concerts"-series in Paulus and Sofienberg church in Oslo, and at the Røa Festival of Music. During the 2021/2022 season she has been a soloist at the Oslo Concert Hall and Stavanger Concert Hall, and she toured with the Norwegian Youth Orchestra and performed with them at the Oslo Chamber Music Festival. She has also played several organ concerts for children and young people with her organ duet partner Kristoffer Myre Eng, and she has been selected to represent Norway at the Nordic Church

Music Symposium in Denmark in 2024. As well as working freelance as an organist, pianist, singer and accompanist, Hannah is the principal organist at Sinsen church in Oslo. In Norway she is most known from the TV series "Presten" (The Priest) shown on NRK, where she played the role as the organist

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
